### NATURE NOTES

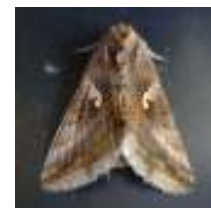
**Butterflies and Moths.** The Butterfly Transects finished at the end of September, a detailed analysis of the butterflies recorded should be available by the end of the year. Our 4 sites (Catherington Down, Hazleton Common, The Holt and Horndean Down) were all walked weekly by up to 12 volunteers and the results were co-ordinated by Matt (HPC Ranger) and John Nundy. On many days especially in September even on warm sunny days the count was very disappointing. One thing everybody noticed was the great abundance of Whites especially Large Whites and the next runner up was the Speckled Wood, still noticeable in October. There were very few Red Admirals this year and almost no peacocks or Painted Ladies even on the Buddleja bushes, the Whites had the flowers all to themselves !

Moths did not do much better, plenty of species came to the traps in July but very few in September. We will produce the usual combined list by the end of the year. One species that did well was the **Silver Y** (*Autographa gamma*) The one on the right came to the trap at night on the 8th July (Victory Av.) I do not know the ID of the moth on the left which also came to the light on 8th July

**Other Insects.** There seems to have been a big decline in insects this autumn with many plants and trees with healthy unattacked leaves but on a hot afternoon walk in Blendworth fields on 10th October 2018 walkers were met with a plague of **Harlequin Ladybirds**. Hundreds were flying and landing on



gates and stiles and on skin and clothes - and they do bite ! Their larvae must have eaten all the aphids in the area. Aphids are an important food for small birds especially blue tits at this time of the year. The Ladybirds were mostly flying east across Woodhouse Lane in Blendworth. Only 2 weeks ago there were hundreds of Craneflies in the same area but no butterflies ! Several **Dor beetles** have been seen on the paths through the Holt (on Monarchs Way)

**Birds and Animals.** There has been an increase in **House Sparrows** especially in the colony that lives in Victory Avenue. As many as 20 plus come regularly to the feeding stations in our gardens. They are recorded on the BTO Garden Birdwatch. An unusual report that a **Redstart** was spotted in a tree on Catherington Down by Rosie Blackburn, thanks for sending this record. We are glad to report that **Hedgehogs** and **Slowworms** seem to be doing well around Catherington Lane area and Deryn (chairman of South Down Group) has recorded many foxes and even badgers on her webcam in her Lovedean garden.
